### 1. Inside Higher Ed

#### Low-Income High Schools Shut Out (Global view)

College-going rates among high school graduates declined across the board this fall, but far fewer graduates of low-income and high-poverty high schools, and of high schools with many Black and Hispanic students, enrolled in college during the pandemic, new data show. Immediate college enrollment fell by an unprecedented 6.8 percent this fall, compared with a 1.5 percent year-over-year decline in fall 2019, according to a new special analysis of the High School Benchmarks report from the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center. While a 6.8 percent decline is far better than an earlier estimate of 21.7 percent, it is still 4.5 times larger than the 2019, pre-pandemic rate. The National Student Clearinghouse Research Center puts together annual reports on high school graduates' postsecondary enrollment, persistence and completion outcomes. It has also released several analyses of college enrollment amid the pandemic. The latest analysis updates preliminary results posed in December. It also corrects a process error that resulted in an overestimate of the rate of decline in college enrollment counts throughout the December report.

#### When the Campus Becomes a Lab to Study COVID (Global view)

A major study will seek to enroll more than 12,000 students at 21 universities in an effort to answer a key question: Does Covid-19 spread after vaccination? The project, announced Friday, could shed valuable insight on the future trajectory of the pandemic as the pace of vaccination increases. #### Higher education is part of the Agenda 2030 ecosystem (Global view)

Universities must convince governments and development agencies that higher education is not a luxury but an essential part of the education ecosystem needed to achieve the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by 2030, according to three international networks representing more than

2,000 institutions. Their call came during a webinar co-organized by the Association of Commonwealth Universities (ACU), L'Agence Universitaire de la Francophonie (AUF) and the International Association of Universities (IAU) on 23 March, which looked at the pivotal year for higher education and the Agenda 2030 SDGs. Opening the 90-minute debate between university representatives from Africa, the Caribbean and Europe, Joanna Newman, secretary general of the ACU, said most development agencies still believed their focus should be on primary education or up to Year 12, and many people saw higher education as part of an ivory tower.

### **New players enter Afro-Arab agriculture partnership (Uganda)**

The entry of new partners into the upcoming second Afro-Arab forum for higher education and agriculture is expected to accelerate collaboration between universities and organisations in the two blocs, forge closer ties and help increase opportunities for youth employment. The forum, which brings together the Regional Universities Forum for Capacity Building in Agriculture (RUFORUM), the Ugandan government and a number of Arab institutions, was held for the first time in 2019. However, in October 2021, new allies will join the partnership, including Sudan's Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research and the Islamic Development Bank (IsDB). The aim of the partnership is to foster collaboration and support with the Arab and Gulf countries and universities to promote youth skills development for employability and entrepreneurship in Africa.

### **It's Time to Rethink Higher Education (Global view)**

More interesting is a consideration of how far colleges and universities, beyond those whose wealth and reputations insulate them from both disruption and self-reflection, are willing to go to mitigate the crisis. How fundamental are the assumptions we are willing to challenge? How many established orthodoxies and traditions are we willing seriously to interrogate? Will this be a slight mid-air course correction or a redesign of the plane? In an industry where the elimination of a small program, the creation of a new interdisciplinary minor, or even the renaming of a department is considered dramatic change, these are important questions.

### 11 Ways to Protect Privacy When Using Student Data (Global view)

While student data has long been mined to support retention efforts and institutional decision-making, the COVID-19 pandemic has introduced new and sometimes troubling uses for data in higher education. For example, campuses might track students' location and social media data to monitor social distancing compliance and help prevent virus outbreaks, according to a new report from NASPA and New America. The pandemic has also "heightened campus interest in tracking student data to better understand how students are faring in online learning environments and the need to intervene with the right resources at the right time," the report explained. More than ever, the researchers argued, there is a vital need for transparency in how colleges collect and use personal data. To gauge students' perceptions of data use in higher education, NASPA and New America conducted a series of student focus groups, discussing campus privacy, contact tracing, targeted outreach and more. Participants represented a variety of institution types, academic levels, instructional formats and racial/ethnic categories. Among the findings:
